1 Name

This instrument is the *Proceeds of Crime Amendment (Unexplained Wealth) Regulations 2020.*

2 Commencement

Schedule 1—Amendments

Proceeds of Crime Regulations 2019

1 After subsection 20(1)

Insert:

Australian Capital Territory

(1A) For the purposes of the definition of *unexplained wealth legislation* in section 338 of the Act, the unexplained wealth legislation of the Australian Capital Territory is Part 7A of the *Confiscation of Criminal Assets Act 2003* (ACT), and the other provisions of that Act that relate to that Part.

Note:

Section 11C of the Australian Capital Territory Act (which defines *serious criminal activity*) is an example of a provision that relates to Part 7A of that Act because Part 7A refers to that term.

2 Schedule 2 (at the end of table 7)

Add:

3 an unexplained wealth order

subsection 98D(1) of the Confiscation of Criminal Assets Act 2003

3 Schedule 3 (at the end of table 7)

Add:

an unexplained wealth restraining order

subsection 32A(2) of the Confiscation of Criminal Assets Act 2003
